Captain Robert Falcon Scott, RN, wrote of Antarctic in his Journal on 17 January 1912:

"Great God! This is an awful place!"

Scott had expectations; detailed expectations are dangerous things for explorers to have. The value of exploration has as much to do with voyage as with destination, and success depends far more on finding something rather than confirming one's suppositions.

The holidays are coming...days freighted with our memories of holidays past. In those memories are rooted our expectations of this season's holidays. Holidays can bring joy, and holidays can be as hostile as Antarctica. We set ourselves up to expect something. When our expectations are not met, we, mimicking Scott, declare of the holidays: **"Great God! This is an awful place!"**

What expectations do you bring to your exploration of the days ahead? The taste of your grandmother's latkes, when she's been dead for 30 years? The wonder of midnight services that never quite achieve the mystery and reverential awe of your childhood?

Often, we want what our former holidays gave us so much that we cannot receive what our present holidays offer us. We savor the memory-distilled sweetness of then so much that now inevitably disappoints us, not because it isn't good, but because it isn't then. [The t-shirt maxim is true, you know: "The older I get, the better I was."] We want the remembered event, (or we want to avoid the remembered event), so much that we miss the current possibilities. How can we treasure memory and explore the present terrains of life? The best way to do this is to explore carrying memories to be added-to rather than replicated. Holidays do not attack us, intending us harm. We do that harm to ourselves and each other in the context of expectations and memories which may be too perfect ever fully to be achieved or reproduced.

Scott's expedition was doomed by his desire to have pre-conceived notions confirmed by circumstances of which he could have no accurate prior knowledge, and over which he could never have full control. We bring the same expectations to the holidays if we're not careful. The record suggests that Scott wanted to be a hero rather than an explorer. We can approach the holidays in the same confusion if we're not careful; it will produce "Scott-results"freezing to death. The heroic triumph of the gift given, the party hosted, the family meal served may never measure up to the expectations with which we load them; we become like Scott, destination more important than journey.

Approach the holidays chastened by Robert Falcon Scott, who failed before he set foot on Antarctica only because he never really went there to explore anyway. The holidays are a voyage of exploration rather than a destination in our expectations. What will you discover? I pray it will be gentle time, substantive conversation, and authentic relationships....all of it more wonderful and holy than you ever could plan, imagine, or recall.

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT

As we approach the end of 2023, it is with such overwhelming gratitude that I write this message to you. During this year, we have made significant strides in outreach, growth, giving, family programs and ministry. There is not enough room in this entire newsletter for all of the names of those who have given so much of their time, talent and treasure to make Christ Church what it is today, a warm, welcoming beacon of light and love in this community.

Over the past few months, our stewardship campaign was undertaken with great hope and a little anxiety. The goal was set twenty thousand dollars higher than it had ever been. (Would parishioners respond? Were we too aggressive?) The answer to the Stewardship Committee was a resounding affirmation of the love and commitment to our church home and family. The response to the campaign was stunning and inspiring, Christ Church said YES!

Now, lest you think that this is all a slam dunk and we can just rest on our gift plan laurels, let me just gently remind you that gift plans are prayerful, loving intentions and not cash in hand, they also may go unfulfilled if the giver has an unforeseen situation that compromises their ability to contribute. For most of us who submitted one, they are budgeted out over weekly, monthly or quarterly contributions and cannot be counted on to be there at the onset. This is why we gratefully accept all plans large, small or after the campaign has ended regardless of the total previously received.

Planned giving represents only 75% of the budgeted revenue for the year and the balance, we pray, will be made up of unplanned giving or additional revenue sources. Even with that, we still have to work with a deficit budget which requires us to draw money from our Endowment funds. Deficit budgeting is not sustainable for the long term.

Which brings me to even more gratitude. Our unplanned giving was far higher than anticipated to date in 2023, expenses have been at or very close to expected, and, as I write this, we are nowhere near the deficit we had planned for this year. And, THAT is why I want you to know that everything you do for this parish counts, from the dollar that is put in the plate, to helping with projects around the building, from volunteering with the soup group for a few hours to making a large donation. Everything helps us to continue in our mission to feed, love and bring comfort to our church family and the community around us, as we are fed, loved and comforted by God through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit.

Columbarium Rules and Regulations were submitted to the Vestry by Charlie Schwan for the Broad Creek Cemetery. They were approved unanimously by the Vestry.

A 2024 budget (Ver. 9) was presented with a Recommendation from the Finance Committee to approve and adopt. The budget as presented was approved by the Vestry. It will be published at the Annual Meeting.

The final audit report to the diocese was submitted to the Diocese of Easton for all three entities of Christ Church (church, school and cemetery). Recommendations are being studied and implemented.

A Search Committee will be formed and charged to undertake a call for a new Rector in December. They will begin work with guidance from the Interim Rector in January of 2024.

Celebrating God's Gifts!

It is indeed a cause for celebration, with an abundant dose of gratitude! Our remarkable parish is once again generously demonstrating its passion to do God's will. **Many thanks** to everyone who has already shared their Gift Plans for 2024 and to those who will soon join in the celebration!



We have already received Gift Plans toward the Operating Fund from 75 families for \$190,834 – just over **100%** of our campaign goal! Very, very well done! **Thank you!**

Our mortgage balance is now \$122,891, down more than \$125,000 over the past twelve months. So far in our Celebrating God's Gifts Campaign, we have received sufficient Gift Plans from 56 families to cover all twelve mortgage payments in 2024. Our Finance Team is analyzing the impact of these remarkable numbers. However, it seems that, if all these planned gifts are fulfilled, we may be able to eliminate our mortgage debt in 2025. Once again, very, very well done! Many, many thanks!

With all this success, why you may ask, should I submit a Gift Plan if I haven't already done so? Consider, if you will, that our church funds its remarkable work on God's behalf with only three sources of funding:

What we **Give**, What we **Earn**, and What we **Take** from endowments.

To realize our mission and accomplish all that we want to do for our community, we have continued to spend more than we **Give** and **Earn**. Consequently, we are forced to **Take** from our endowments, the future of our church. This approach is unsustainable. Our leadership will need to carefully allocate our resources. Each of us will need to plan for and do what we can to help realize our collective dreams. Please refer to our Senior Warden's eloquent comments about this in this Newsletter. News on Contributions

As our pledge drive comes to a close, I was asked to give an update regarding the reissue of some envelope numbers. In the past, Christ Church ordered over 100 boxes of envelopes for parishioners, upwards of 200 boxes in a time long ago. With online donations and bank issued checks, we no longer need as many boxes of envelopes.

In an effort to save money and prevent most of the envelopes ending up in recycling (members leaving, not picking up their envelopes, etc., etc.), we have limited our order of envelopes to 50 boxes. Those who have numbers below 50 will keep their numbers. Those above 50 will be assigned a new number.

BACKPACK WEEKEND MEALS FOR KIDS WE ARE BLESS AND VERY, VERY GRATEFUL!

Every week during the school year, Christ Church and community volunteers gather on Thursday mornings to prepare, pack and deliver 175 bags of weekend food for food-insecure children in three schools. During the summer we support the QACPS Migrant Program and summer school sessions at the four Title I schools.

By the end of 2023, 25 energetic volunteers will have helped to plan for, prepare and deliver about 6,000 bags of weekend food to children in need.

Christ Church is part of a coalition of 10 churches that provide weekend meals for 630 children in every elementary and middle school in the county. We help coordinate the county-wide program and serve as a hub for delivery of Maryland Food Bank supplies used by the churches. The program is partially funded by Queen Anne's County and the churches provide the rest.

Through this work, our hands are reaching out to vulnerable children and families in our local community. We rely on the love and caring support of our volunteers who shop for and donate food, prepare and fill bags, deliver the food, and send in cash to help support this vital ministry.
