NOTES ON...

...+Martin:Tours...

Martin, one of the patron saints of France as well as the patron of warriors, was born *circa* 330 at Sabaria, modern-day Szombathely, in Hungary. His early years were spent at Pavia in Italy. After a term of service in the Roman army, he traveled and finally settled in Poitiers, whose bishop, Hilary, he had come to admire.

The Tradition says that, while still preparing for Baptism, Martin was approached by a poor man, asking for alms in the name of Christ. Martin, drawing his sword, divided his military cloak and gave half to the beggar. On the following night, Jesus appeared to Martin, clothed in half a cloak, and said to him, "Martin, a simple catechumen, covered me with this garment."

Hilary ordained Martin to the priesthood sometime between 350 and 353. Inspired by the new monastic movement stemming from Egypt, Martin established a hermitage at nearby Liguge. To his dismay, he was named Bishop of Tours in 372. He reluctantly agreed to serve, hoping to continue his strict, ascetic habit of life. His monastery of Marmoutier, near Tours, had a great influence on the development of Celtic monasticism in Britain, where Ninian, among others, promoted Martin's ascetic and missionary ideals. The oldest church in Canterbury is dedicated to St. Martin.

Martin was unpopular among his episcopal colleagues, both because of his manner of life and his strong opposition to their oft-times violent prosecution of heresy. He was a diligent missionary to the pagan folk living near near his hermitage, and was always a staunch defender of the poor and the helpless.

Martin died 1628 years ago - 11 November 397. His shrine at Tours became a popular site for pilgrimages, and a secure sanctuary for those seeking protection and justice.

...on Veterans' Day...


It was not until 1954 that this day was called Veterans' Day. Before that, it was Armistice Day, so-called because the truce concluding World War I went into effect on 11 November 1918 at 1100 local time in France. That "11th hour, 11th day, 11th month" observance was taught to so many of us as schoolchildren. For my part, I never recall being given the day off from school, but I do recall standing beside my desk in silence at 1100 on the day. I remember as well that my teachers said "Armistice Day" rather than "Veterans' Day," the older designation persisting in common usage after 1954. Our national custom and usage has expanded the original meaning as well as the name of this day, so we now include a time of remembrance and thanks for those who served and lived to come home. That makes this day a day belonging to all of us.... those who have served, and those who slept safe and sound because of that service.

Memorial Day (*originally called Decoration Day*) is much older than Veterans' Day, and specifically honors the war-dead. <u>Too often we diminish the focus of each day when we blur the stark demarcation intended by observing Memorial Day and Veterans' Day months apart and as separate, distinct days. I am glad we have *this* day to honor veterans and a separate day upon which to honor the war-dead. On Veterans' Day, we are proud to stay focused and clear to say "Thanks" to while veterans' ears can hear us on this side of the grave.</u>

Our weekly prayers on Sundays remember persons serving right now, and we pray asking that one day they may say these Veterans' Day prayers with us.

Enough. Enjoy this time together. God bless you.

The Right Reverend, The XIII Bishop of New York Paul Moore, Jr.

"The President of the United States of America takes pleasure in presenting the Navy Cross to Second Lieutenant Paul Moore, Jr. (MCSN: 0-8836), United States Marine Corps (Reserve), for extraordinary heroism and distinguished service while in command of a platoon of Company G, Second Battalion, Fifth Marines, First Marine Division, in combat against enemy Japanese forces in the Matanikau River Area, Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands, on the morning of 3 November 1942. Pressing forward in the face of a steady barrage of hostile machine-gun and mortar fire, Second Lieutenant Moore, by aggressive charges and skillful employment of his units, forced the enemy to retreat to the ocean's edge. As the Japanese fought desperately to survive, he stayed on the line with his platoon, directing its fire under terrific assaults by the enemy, and urged his men forward in a series of hand-grenade and bayonet charges, personally leading their successive attacks. In the final stages of the engagement, although critically wounded by a hand grenade fragment and lying prostrate and helpless, he continued to encourage his men to keep attacking until he lost consciousness. His cool, courageous daring and outstanding leadership were an inspiration to all in his command."

The Silver Star and the Purple Heart were awarded with Lt. Moore's Navy Cross for the Matanikau River action.







"Chesty" Puller, shown here as a Major General, dropped out of VMI to enlist in the Marine Corps during World War I. He was promoted through the ranks, retiring as the most decorated Marine in our history. Among many other decorations, he received five Navy Crosses and one Distinguished Service Cross.

Known for colorful speech and forthright demeanor, he is remembered as saying: "Alright. They're in front of us, they're behind us, they're on our left and they're on our right. They can't get away this time."

LtGen Puller was a member of Christ Episcopal Church, Saluda, Virginia, where he is buried in the churchyard.

"The Distinguished Service Cross is presented to Henry W. Hobson, Major, U.S. Army, for extraordinary heroism in action near St. Mihiel, France, September 12, 1918. Within ten minutes after the beginning of the advance, at 5 a. m., Major Hobson was twice wounded in the shoulder by a machine-gun bullet and by shrapnel in the leg. Being in command of the assault battalion and realizing the importance of its operations, he continued to accompany and direct his command throughout the day, notwithstanding his wounds which caused him great pain and difficulty of movement. At halts he had to be assisted to lie down and get up by his adjutant; nevertheless, he remained on duty until the fighting of the day was over."
