A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols

14 December 2025 ten o'clock in the morning

Things we love and truths we treasure quickly become enshrined in our hearts, and almost overnight come to feel like ancient, time-honored features of our lives. That is certainly the case with The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols. Its formal character and comforting warmth make it feel ancient, but it is not. The Very Rev'd Eric Milner-White, Dean of the Chapel at King's College, Cambridge, instituted this service to be sung on Christmas Eve, 1918, six weeks and one day after the Armistice concluding World War I. Milner-White adapted it from a similar service authorized for use in 1880 by The Rt. Rev'd Edward White Benson, Jr. in The Cathedral Church of The Blessed Virgin Mary at Truro. The lessons were reordered in 1919, and what we use here is the order as Dean Milner-White adjusted it that year. The Festival has become so firmly established in the life of the Church that since 1928, the service has been broadcast live from King's College every year save one (1930) *via* the BBC World Service.

Each year at King's, the service begins with "Once in Royal David's City," sung as a treble solo by one of the choristers. "The soloist is not selected until the final seconds before broadcast. 'We actually don't identify to the boy himself who's going to sing it until the BBC's red light starts flashing,' says Stephen Cleobury, fellow, organist and director of music at King's. 'It prevents one individual getting really stewed up for 10 days or a fortnight beforehand.'"

Dean Milner-White intended that the Festival be (and at King's College it remains) a Christmas Eve service; the lessons, and music are meant to move deliberately from the season of Advent into Christmastide. Hundreds of parishes and cathedral churches throughout the Anglican Communion have adopted the Festival over the years, modifying its length and the music for local usage on other days as needed. So it is that we sing Lessons and Carols on Kent Island this morning rather than on Christmas Eve. *The Authorized Version of 1611* (the King James version) is always used at King's College; the lesson texts printed here are from the *New Revised Standard Version* of the Bible.

Beloved in Christ, be it in this holy season of Advent our care and delight to hear again the message of the angels, and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem and see this thing which is come to pass, and the Babe lying in a manger. Therefore, let us read and mark in Holy Scripture the tale of the loving purposes of God from the first days of our disobedience unto the glorious Redemption brought us by this Holy Child.

But first, let us pray for the needs of the whole world; for peace on earth and goodwill among all his people; for unity within the Church he came to build, and especially in this town of Stevensville on Kent Island, and in The Diocese of Easton. And because this of all things would rejoice his heart, let us remember, in his name, the poor and helpless, the cold, the hungry, and the oppressed; the sick and them that mourn, the lonely and the unloved, the aged and the little children; all those who know not the Lord Jesus, or who love him not, or who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

Lastly, let us remember before God all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore, and in a greater light, that multitude which no one can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom in the Lord Jesus we are for ever one.

These prayers and praises let us humbly offer up to the Throne of Heaven, in the words which Christ himself taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil; for thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

May the Almighty God bless us with his grace; Christ give us the joys of everlasting life, and unto the fellowship of the citizens above may the King of Angels bring us all. *Amen*.

The First Lesson read by Dr. Gary Van Essen

Genesis 3: 8–15; 17–19 God tells sinful Adam that he has lost the life of Paradise and that his seed will bruise the serpent's head.

The man and his wife heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and they hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden. 


With righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth;

Luke 2: 1; 3–7 St Luke tells of the birth of Jesus.

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to

Matthew 2: 1–12 The wise men are led by the star to Jesus.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." 
The Ninth Lesson read by The Rev'd Frank B. Crumbaugh III **John 1: 1–14** St John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.
